From Rabbi Moch

"Achieving Holiness Requires Less of Me"

Dear Haveirim and Haveirot,

We are getting ready for Pesach and at the same time we are reading the Book of Vayikra, or Leviticus. This book addresses its concerns to building and maintaining a life of kedusha, holiness, for the individual and for the community. The Book of Vayikra begins "Vayikra el Moshe," "[Adonai] called to Moses." The ability to experience such a Divine call defines holiness. The content of the book that follows speaks of the meaning of sacrifice and purity. At its heart we read "You shall be holy for I, Adonai, your God, am holy." Often, however, we find a sense of kedusha difficult to achieve and more difficult to maintain.

If we were to go back to the very beginning of Vayikra and look at the Hebrew text, we would notice something unusual. The first word Vayikra is written with a small letter Aleph at the end; this hints at an important insight to achieving kedusha. Aleph also begins the word "ani" meaning "I" and it begins the word "Anochi", the word that God uses when God says "I". "Anochi Adonai Eloheicha," - "I am Adonai Your God." Holiness has to do with letting that "ani" (one's 'I' or sense of self) connect with and experience something of "Anochi" (God's Eternal 'I"). The very nature of "ani" - awareness of self and self-need - almost always gets in the way. "Ani" (my sense of 'I'-ness) says, "What's in it for me?" In human relationships, one person's concern for 'self,' may prevent real or enduring connection with any other significant 'self'. My own problems, or issues or concerns or needs keep me from hearing, understanding or attending to the problems, issues, concerns and needs of others for whom I tell myself I care.

The cosmology of Kabbalah offers us a solution to overcoming this ubiquitous human stumbling block. Kabbalah teaches that before the beginning, God wanted to create a universe, but could not because God filled all potential space and time; there remained no room for a universe (that which is other than God). God then performed a "tzimtzum" an act of "contraction," drawing back, pulling back part of God's self and making room somewhere inside for a universe to come into being. Continued on page 2.

Rabbi, continued from page 1. The same must be true on the smaller scale of human existence. Moses, whom the Torah calls the most-humble of human beings, could hear that call to which most of us remain deaf. Our own lack of humility gets in our way. The small Aleph at the end of Vayikra tells us of the need for tzimtzum, drawing back, for making our needy ani 'I' smaller, in order to allow for the possibility for God's Eternal Anochi to enter into our spiritual awareness. Only by lessening self-concern can we open ourselves to the kedusha of becoming a vessel for the outpouring of Divine Anochi, the 'I' of the Eternal.

When someone enters the Synagogue wondering what s/he will get out of it or leaves asking whether s/he got anything out of the experience, that person's concerns for his or her ani prevent any real kedusha from blossoming. To allow an awareness of holiness to begin, one must first make less of one's 'I'. Instead of asking 'What will I get out of this?" ask "How must I enter into this?" Kabbalah teaches that one must achieve "Bitul Yesh" or the elimination of one's sense of self before one can glimpse the "Throne of Divine Glory." Eliminating one's sense of self does not come easy to anyone, and is certainly not a Jewish strength. That makes if all the more important to work at making "less of 'Me'. Crossing this great internal divide is the Red Sea whose waters are parted by making the alef of ani smaller. When we succeed, it allows for entire worlds, even universes, to grow in the space we vacate. We are told in the Torah not just to refrain from eating hameitz, leavened bread, on Pesach but rather to rid our houses of all hameitz. Hameitz, bread made from fermentation processes that puff-up the dough, represents an inflated sense of self that prevents us from leaving Mitzrayim (Egypt). Mitzrayim literally means "narrow places" of our lives. Getting rid of an imposing sense of self could be the most important preparation we make for Pesach this or any year.

We administer four totally separate and distinct sections in the Hatley Memorial Gardens and provide space for all persuasions of Jewish life from orthodox to secular, complete with cremation if specified.

The Society works with the Victoria Chevrah Kadisha in preparation of the body for burial, and works with the family in all ways to ensure that the concern and embrace of the entire community for the bereaved.

While we are a non profit Society, regretfully, end of life does not respect one's pocketbook, and costs are dear. There is a small membership charge that must be paid to become a member of our Society, and arrangements for this, and for burial requirements may be made at any time. We recommend dealing with one's self and saving the pain and expense of the survivors at a very stressful time.

Every Purim since I can remember as a child, my brothers and I dressed up in our parents' clothes, and wished we were the characters from the famed M'gillah,

from the book of Esther. I used to wear my mother's lipstick and pearl necklace and her turquoise embroidered scarf around my head, and I became Queen Esther for a day. My younger brother, naturally was Mordechai, since his middle name actually is Mordechai, named after the famous Jewish uncle. We'd feast on Hamantashan cookies filled with prunes and poppy seeds, and excitedly hiss and boo at any mention of the wicked Haman character.

Last Friday night at the Victoria Jewish Community Centre, Kolot Mayim's celebration reminded me of those lovely childhood memories in the synagogue back home. But



now, as a young adult bringing my (albeit non-Jewish) partner to the shul, I was able to appreciate it with new eyes. My partner, Rowan, who is originally from PEI ,(a true Maritimer), although he grew up in a family of scientists with English, Irish, and Scottish heritage, he recalls one of his earliest childhood memories was also a celebration of the story of Purim, as his Jewish grade school teacher taught all the children in her class the story.

It is a long-time ritual and custom in Reform Judaism for celebrants to dress in costumes, have festive parties, and perform "Purim-spiels," or silly theatrical adaptations of the story of the *M'gillah*. On Friday night's Shabbat service, Rabbi Moch led us through the service with a silly theatrical adaptation and retelling of the story of Esther, and various members of the congregation each played a part.



Kis Brink was a compelling second narrator, the lovely Queen Esther was played beautifully by Arlette Baker, Martin Hergt was a distinguished King Ahashverus, and Mordechai was performed with panache by our Vice President Richard Weiss. Aaron Banfield (our membership Chairman) showed off his theatrical background as he hammed up the role of Haman, inciting laughter and giggles and noisy groggers. The costumes and props were also a fine touch. Kis Brink's beautiful robe glistened under the lights. Martin Hergt had fun waving the yellow fly swatter aka royal scepter around, and the hats worn by Richard and Aaron were funny and fitting. In fact, Aaron, recited how finding his perfect black, threecornered Haman hat for the role was a Purim miracle!

The story goes: He had searched all over town a few days before the event, in all the fancy shops and no one seemed to have a three-cornered hat. Disappointed, Aaron decided to walk back to his home in Fernwood. Along the way, he spotted

The University of Victoria has added a chair in transgender studies to its faculty, the first such position in the world. The position was afforded by a \$1 million US donation from the Tawani Foundation. The Americanbased organization has also pledged to match any other donations towards the position to a maximum of another \$1 million US.

Dr. Aaron Devor, currently a professor in the university's sociology department and the former dean of its

graduate studies faculty, was appointed the inaugural chair.

He also founded the extensive Transgender Archives at UVic, established in 2012.

Dr. Devor will work with researchers, community activists and students to advance study into a broad range of topics that affect the lives of transgender people. He will explore crucial issues on the subject including health care, poverty, discrimination and suicide.
