From Rabbi Moch



The *Kedusha* (Holiness) We Find Only Within Community

I have been to certain places around the world
– places having nothing to do with Jewish life –
where I felt an almost palpable connection between

heaven and earth. These places exuded a sense of holiness. I define kedusha as a sense of connection with the greater power that a certain place or time or event or thing gives to me. Many people to whom I have spoken, have said that they experience God best on a mountain top or sitting on a rocky point and watching the waves of the sea crash endlessly beneath them. Those uniquely spiritual places can certainly connect us with all that exists beyond ourselves. I remember an ancient capital of the Katchiquel Kingdom in Guatemala, and feeling that heaven and earth felt connected in that place. I returned to that same spot years later expecting to feel that same sense of holy connection, but instead, to my surprise, I felt nothing special or connecting. I remember the wonderful connectedness and kedusha I would feel each Shabbat when observing it with friends. That was a time in my life when I did not use electricity or travel in a car on Shabbat. Years later, when trying to recapture that Shabbat *kedusha*, I once again began walking to Synagogue - two and a half miles in each direction in the Florida heat or rain. I did that for a year by myself, and felt disappointed that the *kedusha* I had experienced in earlier years observing Shabbat with my friends, eluded me now, trying to recapture it on my own.

This week's parasha from the Torah, Aharei Mot/Kedoshim tells us of a different kind of *kedusha* (holiness). "Adonai said to Moses, 'Speak to all the community of Israel and say to them "You shall be holy for I Adonai, your God am holy."'

The great 11th Century scholar, Rashi, citing earlier commentaries (Sifra: Torah Kohnim and Vayikra Rabba 24:5) tells us that the phrase "all the community of" means that the statement was actually said in the presence of all Israel. God telling Moses to speak to all the community on God's behalf would then be purposeless, since all the community heard God directly. ---> p. 2

Rabbi, continued from page 1. The 19th Century commentary, Chatam Sofer, tells us to read the verse differently. [In the presence of all Israel] Adonai said to Moses "Speaking to all the community of Israel is how you become holy as I, Adonai, your God, am holy."

This commentary suggests that the highest form of holiness, the kind that is like unto the holiness of Adonai, cannot be the holiness of the lone hermit on a mountain top. This kind of holiness sprouts only from the interactive human connections one makes with the higher power in the context of community.

Here we find the true purpose of religious communities and certainly of Jewish communities and institutions. They bring people together where they can help each other perceive the kedusha which surrounds them. We connect to the higher power through connecting with each other, in helping each other, in learning from each other, in growing with each other, in perfecting a broken world with each other, in healing wounded souls with each other, in seeking purpose and meaning with each other.

Those who find God in isolation do perceive the grandeur and majesty of creation. In community, though, we experience the grief of the Ever-Present God during such times as a tragic bombing or car used as a weapon to plow through a crowd at a public event. In community, we experience the gentle compassion of the Ever-Present God, healing those crushed by such loss, as the grief-stricken learn to reconstruct their lives. In community, we experience the ecstatic joy of the Ever-Present God in every small victory of witnessing personal limitations overcome by others and higher purpose found in the wisdom of others. Each generates a kind of kedusha which comes as it helps us connect with each other and with God in community. Perhaps this explains why our words for God – Adonai and Elohim – express divinity in the plural. God can be experienced most fully in community, for divinity is where ALL comes together.

We open ourselves to the Divine, to Higher Power, to God, when we come together as part of a sacred community — for us, as part of a Jewish community, here in Victoria, BC. Join us at Kolot Mayim. Explore your *kedusha* in coming together with others for a higher purpose and return home carrying the feeling that you have connected with and accessed something inexpressibly numinous and holy.

The Mendelssohns: Three Generations of Genius

by Herbert Kupferberg, Charles Scribner & Sons, NY, 1972

I was fortunate to have had a brief meeting take place in the JCCV Library. Filed on a shelf directly across from me was this book. I was intrigued. When I noted that the last person to have read it was a late beloved member of our congregation, Gerry Marks, I couldn't resist! If you are interested in music and/or the history of modern Judaism, this is the book for you.

Although the majority of the book focusses on Felix Mendelssohn and his siblings, the first two parts of the book offer shorter biographies of Felix's grandfather, Moses, and his father, Abraham. Moses, although an observant orthodox Jew, was instrumental in the beginnings of modernizing our faith. He argued that what makes Judaism unique is its divine revelation of a code of law. He wrote many philosophical treatises and is considered the father of the Jewish Enlightenment.

Abraham Mendelssohn, Felix's father, is noted to have said, "Once I was the son of a famous father; now I am the father of a famous son."

Abraham took an uncompromising attitude towards his Jewish origins. He felt that the day of Judaism was over and that it was necessary to take practical steps to assimilate with German society.

I'll leave you with one of the fascinating facts I learned from reading this book: Felix Mendelssohn was responsible for the use of a baton by the conductor of an orchestra!

Honey Mustard Chicken

By popular request, Serena Stone has kindly agreed to share her recipe. This is the chicken from the Seder.

Pre-heat oven to 375 °F. Serves 4-6

INGREDIENTS

1 med. red onion-chopped

1/4 c. butter (or subst. scant 1/4 c. olive or grapeseed oil)

½ c. honey (scant)

2 tsp. mild curry powder (not hot curry*)

½ c. Dijon mustard

salt & pepper to taste

6 boneless skinless chicken thighs

*McCormick's makes mild curry powder

DIRECTIONS

In small pan, sauté butter (or oil) & onion on medium low, until tender. Remove from heat. Mix all other ingredients except chicken in bowl. Add in onion mixture & stir well.

Lightly oil baking pan. Place chicken in pan. Pour sauce over. Bake 35-40 minutes, uncovered or until cooked thoroughly.

We recommend dealing with one's self and saving the pain and expense of the survivors at a very stressful time.

Crazy for Coffee

It is a fact fit for any game of trivia that the first coffee house, known as The Angel, in England was opened in Oxford by a man known as Jacob the Jew around 1650.* Coffee has its origin in Africa and the Arabian peninsula, but it is not surprising that Jews, known for their international trade connections, became involved in the commerce of coffee. It is believed that Jews not only imported the coffee bean to Europe, but also the idea of a coffeehouse (Livorno, Italy 1632). Coffeehouses were very popular in the Arabic world. These establishments, which were most often for men only, both in the Middle East and Europe, were popular for more than just their caffeinated beverage as they were also places to gather for "intellectual" conversation and political debate.
