From Rabbi Moch

The Evolution of Anti-Semitism and the Inflating Israeli-Palestinian Rift

As I sit down to write this article, I am still digesting the news of an attack on a synagogue in the Har Nof neighbourhood of Jerusalem that resulted in the death of

four distinguished rabbis, all known as great teachers of this generation, and the death of a brave Druse policeman who ran into the synagogue and shielded others from the attackers with his body. One wonders what would lead to such an attack on a religious institution, far from any disputed part of Jerusalem. The weekly parashah, Toldot, tells of our matriarch Rebecca experiencing great pain as twins Jacob and Esau struggle in her womb. In her prenatal pain, Rebecca cries out, "If this is the way it is going to be, why do I exist?" After inquiring of God, she is told that her two sons represent two warring peoples.

Rebecca's difficulties during her pregnancy seem to point to the very human condition of constant struggle and strife. Her question, "Why me?" answers itself: You were created precisely to learn to manage and assuage and even eliminate that human condition of conflict. Human beings exist precisely that they might learn to overcome the conflicts that their competitive, self-serving spirits inspire.

Six million died in Europe during the Sho'ah because they were Jewish and because the demented and obsessed leader of the Third Reich decided that his mission in life was to rid the world of the people who gave the world conscience. He could not advance his thousand year Reich, which would stand on the basis of might makes right, without first cutting down the tree of Christian teaching which stood in his way. That ethical system, inherited from Judaism demanded conscience and ethical teaching as the guide of societal values. Hitler said, the Jews have inflicted two wounds on civilization, circumcision on the body and conscience on the soul." To accomplish his task, Hitler felt he needed to completely destroy the Jewish roots of Christian Europe, lest new shoots eventually sprout up and undermine the barbarism he hoped would become the new world order.

Hannah Arendt explained that in earlier forms of anti-Semitism, Jews were accused of being Christ Killers. In Fascist Europe, Jews, the source of Christian ethics, were suddenly being killed because they were Christ givers.

Those who died recently in the attack on the Har Nof synagogue were also murdered because they were Jews and because they were teachers of the Jewish faith. The exception to that was the brave Druze policeman, Zidan Sayif, who rushed into the synagogue and sheltered worshippers and his police partner with his body. He died defending a Jewish state that allows him as a minority to live with full rights and the same level of dignity as any Jewish citizen.

We know that the world was ripe with anti-Semitism, not just in Europe, but right here in North America. That anti-Semitism became

Rabbi, Continued from page 2. an entirely different monstrosity in Hitler's Europe. It sought to do much more than ostracize and oppress the Jewish population of your particular duchy or country, and kill a few Jews here and there. It became a government sponsored program to scientifically approve of and then effect the dehumanizing of Jews, then to delegitimize their place and role in society and finally to deport them and murder them, not just a few, but had Hitler won his war, the murder of every last Jew on this planet.

David Nasi, one of the leading 18th Century Jews of Suriname, first an English, then a Dutch colony in South America, wrote a book of Jewish History in which he described anti-Semitism as endemic to European society. He went on to state the in the Americas that was not at all the case, but that Jews are treated as individuals according to their merit. He was probably influenced by living in a Dutch Colony where Jews were entirely accepted in society and later in his life in Philadelphia, where religious tolerance was the principle on which Pennsylvania was established. In reality there was plenty of anti-Semitism in the Americas, outside of his experience.

Hitler's defeat took the wind out of the sails of anti-Semitism in North America. Of course it existed in a sub-societal level, but in the open, anti Semitism decreased as it became widely disapproved of. The Civil Rights movement in the United States helped remove the last Jewish disabilities I remember from my childhood. Jews could no longer be unwelcome in certain neighbourhoods, hotels, clubs and professions.

I grew up seeing the world as an accepting place for Jews. It seemed the world would continue to grow in the direction of tolerance toward all people, Jews included.

The genocidal wars against the Tutsis in Rwanda and the Muslims of Bosnia and several minorities in the Sudan destroyed that notion. Still, we Jews were not part of any of those conflicts and did not suffer from them as a result.

Now, in the twenty-first century to my great surprise and dismay, anti Semitism has reared its ugly old head, both in familiar forms and new forms. The problem has been a markedly severe one in many parts of Europe, especially Sweden, Denmark, France, Germany, and Hungary. Now even England is falling victim to a revival of vicious anti-Semitism. Such activities surface in attacks against individual Jews, including Jewish children, walking on European streets. In many parts of Europe, Jews refrain from walking in public wearing any outward sign of Jewishness, no six-pointed stars or menorahs or chais or kippot. Jews are regularly assaulted verbally and physically, and more than a few have been murdered.

Some of the assailants are old European style anti Semites, others have assumed a new evolved form of anti-Semitism disguised as anti Zionism. These people try to delegitimize Israel as a state by putting Israel's raison d'etre and everything Israel does under a moral microscope reserved for Israel alone among the nations of the world. The Israeli army, trying to stop incessant rocket attacks on Israel, invades Gaza and does so, training its soldiers in how to avoid harming civilians, and employing more measures to insure that civilians are not harmed, than have ever been undertaken by any army of any nation in history. Still, the world condemns Israel's "disproportionate" invasion of Gaza, some even calling it "genocide" or "a crime against humanity." No one hears any statements about collateral civilian casualties as a result of the present bombing of the forces of ISIS by the US, Canada and other allies.

In addition to those two forms of anti-Semitism, today, too many Muslims act out their anger at Israel by attacking Jews or Jewish institutions. Mein Kampf, and the old text book of 19th Century European anti-Semitism, the Protocols of the Elders of Zion, with a mix of other anti Semitic tracts have become perennial best sellers in the Muslim world.

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Rabbi, **continued from page 4.** Muslims I have spoken with often believe that Jews control the world economy and press. An internet search will quickly reveal site after site teaching the familiar, old, vicious lies about the Jews. You can hear the Mahathir Mohamad, the Prime Minister of Malaysia, claim that Jews rule the world. You can listen to Osama Hamadan, the top Hamas representative in Lebanon and a member of the Hamas Political Bureau, repeat the accusation that Jews used to kill Christian children and use their blood to make our holy matzah for Passover. You can hear Sheikh Abu Bilal Ismail, an Imam in Berlin, the city from which Hitler orchestrated the final solution to the Jewish problem, call for the total annihilation of the Jews in the world. Such deceitful or ignorant religious leaders propagate these absurd lies all over the world.

Over the years, I have had many cordial relationships with Palestinians with whom I have felt comfortable speaking about our conflict over the land. One Palestinian man from whom I used to purchased gas in St. Thomas, would always enjoy telling me about his good relations with his Israeli boss. He would commute from Gaza to Tel Aviv to work, and felt that his boss always treated him with respect, caring and dignity. When Sadaam Hussein began firing missiles at Israel during the first Gulf War, his boss said, Don't go back to Gaza. Stay here in our home with our family. We have a bomb shelter and gas masks."

Such friendships are increasingly rare. What has changed that has left Palestinians and Israelis increasingly separated from each other? To me the answer stands clearly between them in the form of a wall. When Israelis and Palestinians worked together, they got to know each other as human beings. Despite the many friendships and relationships, there were also plenty among the Palestinian population who would listen only to the right wing rabble-rousers. Then began the process of terror attacks on buses and cafes and even schools. There was, after all, a conflict over the land. Those attacks in Israel led to fear and frustration on the part of the Israelis. In reaction, and to give them a sense of security, Israel built its version of the Great Wall to keep out terrorists.

I understand the reason Israelis wanted to build this wall, and it has been very successful keeping down the rate of terror attacks in Israel, so it is difficult to make the following point. An unintended consequence of erecting that wall and separating Arabs from Jews has been the isolation of Israelis from Palestinians. That separation of peoples will prove far more dangerous to Israel than hundreds of occasional terror attacks. That separation has allowed rejectionist Palestinians to once again propagate lies about their evil Zionist neighbours. Now that an entire generation of Palestinians has grown up without knowing any Jews personally, it becomes very easy to see Jews as monsters and less than human. It is very difficult, nearly impossible, to find a peaceful accommodation with inhuman monsters. That very wall meant to protect Jews from harm, is harming and making nearly impossible, the ability of the Palestinians to come to a peace arrangement with Israel.

I know it is not easy for a wall of protection to be taken down, once people believe that their safety lies in that wall. If we cannot tear down that wall, let us find ways to bring Palestinians and Israelis around that wall and into each others' lives on a daily basis.

The Jews of Venice put up the very first ghetto walls in that place so that they might feel safe. It was not long before ghetto walls became prison walls for the Jews in cities all over Europe.

Let us pray for the wisdom to live openly with our neighbours, not shut away from them. Let us pray to become bridge builders, not wall builders. Let us tear down the walls we have already built and let us together – on the ashes of the past – build a future of light and glory to the Most High.

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Women Wage Peace

Dear Friends and Family,

I want to let you know about this new movement of women in Israel which I have joined. It was started up in August, following the horrible summer of warfare. A group of women decided that they had to do something other than wringing their hands and saying, "oy vay."

When I was invited to a parlour meeting about a month ago, I was inspired by what they had to say, and I totally identified with their feelings and intentions. I have since been actively involved and am doing my best to help broaden the membership base and help out with activities and events. From this small group which met in August, we now have over 6,000 signed up members! We are hoping to reach 10,000 within the next few months and 100,000 by the end of 2015.

In order to have any appreciable influence on the political decision-makers, we must have large numbers behind us. Our movement is broad-based, inclusive, and non-political. We encourage the support and participation of men as well as women; Jews, Muslims, Christians; Palestinians and Israelis; religious and non-religious; young and old; left-wing, right-wing, and everything in-between across the political spectrum.

The attached articles describe the aims, viewpoint, and activities (so far) of Women Wage **Peace.** We are just beginning. We will not cease our activities until the power-holders on both sides put down their weapons, stop their violence, and sit down at the negotiating table, with no prior conditions, to talk. What we all have in common is our hunger for peace.

We will soon be publishing on our website and Facebook page, notifications and descriptions of our events in English. Until then, I invite you to read the article from Ha'aretz, which is in English, and to view the photos accompanying the article in Yediot Yerushalayim (Jerusalem), which is in Hebrew. (You might notice someone familiar in these photos!) On the website, the About Us section has been translated into English— if you click on ENGLISH at the top of the Homepage, you can access the English version of this section.

I am in the process of translating the registration form for membership. If you wish to offer your support by joining us (no money involved, just your name!), you can try to fill in the form in its Hebrew version (on the website) by clicking on the word (hay resh shin mem hay)* in the navy blue box and filling in the first and third boxes only: name (shin mem soffit) and e-mail (alef yud mem yud yud lamed). The other boxes are not compulsory though, if you want to indicate where you are from, you can fill in the last two boxes which ask for 'region' (Canada/ USA, etc) and 'city' (Vancouver/New York, etc.). * I don't know how to put in the Hebrew; somone teach me, please!

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Progressive Judaism: Start-up Nation's Spiritual Counterpart

Précis of Drash given by Rabbi Leigh Lerner on November 21st.

We were very fortunate, last month, to be the beneficiaries of a visit by Rabbi Leigh Lerner on behalf of ARZA Canada, which is the URJ's Israeli connection. Although the evening started out rather unconventionally, with the Rabbi and everyone else being locked out of the building, the rabbi was unphased by it, and we all soon settled into a very musical service and an exceptionallhy enlightening drash. The thrust of his message is that the Reform movement is alive and well in Eretz Yisrael.

Starting with the premise that Israel is extremely active and successful in technological start-up businesses, and that many of these are being promoted by immigrants, Lerner goes on to compare the partiular influences in Israeli culture which also are leading to the flourishing of Progressive (Reform) Judaism in Israel. The two main influences he sees are the fact that 90 perent of Israelis are immigrants, and therefore endowed with a certain chutzpah which is not afraid of failure, and the compulsory service of all israelis in the IDF, the Israeli army. This services trains the soldiers to think on their feet and stand up and speak up in a non-hierarchical milieu. Lesser contributors are dissatisfaction with the status-quo, a culture of techno-tinkering, and government policies friendly to start-ups.

Maram, Progressive Judaism's rabbinic organization in Israel, has 70 members, largely Israeli born. 75% went to Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem. Because they are not Haredi, these rabbinical students and rabbis serve in the IDF like any other Israeli citizen, on the front lines. The soldiers have respect for these rabbis and these connections build credibility and the [Israel] Movement [for Progressive Judaism (IMPJ)].

Congregation Beit Daniel in Tel Aviv is a shining example. Relegated to an unpoopular area of the city by the Orthodox influenced City Council, then required by that Council to build a bomb shelter and an indoor parking lot, this tempe has thrived in what is now a very yuppy area of Tel Aviv, and there is even a branch in Yaffo! Always in use, the temple is a central address for Jewish life, and Shimon Peres's granddaughter sometimes leads services!

The Haredi are not letting go of the reins easily. For example, marriages performed by Reform rabbis are not recognized. However, many are opting for civil marriages elsewhere and a second Reform ceremony to satisfy their spiritual needs. In the army, rank is not as important as leadership and pragmatic accomplishment. Similarly, we have no chief rabbinate, no downtown Jerusalem office micro-managing our rabbis and their congregants. We've got to use our heads and our hearts and our knowledge to guide us, one congregation, one school at a time. Reform preschools are also thriving, as are day schools sponsored by ARZA in Canada and the US. Virtually every dollar you give to ARZA Canada goes to help establish and sustain IMPJ pre-schools in Israel. We consider it start-up money. It's start-up money for acquainting thousands of Israelis with another way to be Jewish, a liberal way; for Progressive Judaism in Israel, building our movement, and for social progress. Remember that the Israeli government gives every Jew in Israel a free Orthodox synagogue, but non-Orthodox congregations have to raise money for themselves to exist and survive. 8% of Israelis now identify as Reform and Concervative Jews in Israel.
