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Chanukah

In the prayer "Al HaNisim" [for the miracles] that we add during Chanukah, we read that G-d's miraculous deliverance included "the strong into the hands of the weak, the many into the hands of the few, the impure

into the hands of the pure, the wicked into the hands of the righteous, and the provokers into the hands of those who involve themselves with Your Torah."



Rabbi Shlomo Brevda shlit"a, one of the current leaders in the promotion of Jewish ethics, offers an explanation by Rabbi

Yechezkel LeVinson zt"l (of blessed memory) of the progression from pure, to righteous, to involved with Torah. Rabbi LeVinson explained that the entire battle was spiritual - it may have looked like a war, but the battle was supernatural, and depended upon spiritual levels rather than physical strength. Thus each level of evil, as embodied in a Greek soldier, could only be overcome by a Jew with a corresponding level of holiness.

The average soldier was not truly evil, but was merely dominated by the impure practices and beliefs of the Greek oppressors. To rebuff him, a Jew merely needed to avoid these impurities - and thus the battle brought "the impure into the hands of the pure."

There were other Greeks who were indeed evil (who helped to set up idols in the Temple and force Jews to abandon their faith). Such soldiers could only be beaten by those who were not merely free of Hellenist beliefs, but had dedicated themselves to observe Mitzvos even when self-sacrifice was involved - meaning it had to be "the wicked into the hands of the righteous."

Finally, there were those Greeks who were "great in their [Cont'd. p. 9.](#)

We are rapidly approaching the time of the 25th — that is, the 25th of the month of December and the 25th of the month of Kislev.

The 25th of the month of December, called Christmas, celebrates the birth of Yehoshua who becomes the founder of the Christian spiritual path and who is considered to be the Messiah by Christians.

The 25th of the month of Kislev, called Chanukah, celebrates the freedom of our people from Greek domination, the right to worship in our own way, and the miracle of a small bit of oil that lasted eight days instead of the expected one day. It is considered a minor holiday in the Jewish liturgical calendar.

In most Western countries, the 25th of the month of December is a national holiday. It is celebrated by people giving each other presents, decorating trees, and having festive parties. Santa Claus visits households, leaving presents for children.

The 25th of the month of Kislev is celebrated by lighting candles for eight days with a special blessing, spinning a top called a dreidel, eating special foods that relate to oil (to remind us of the miracle) and by giving small gifts. In most Western countries, the holiday of Chanukah receives scant attention by anyone except Jews. The Jewish people make up approximately 0.1%-0.2% of all the peoples of the world.

In many households today that are comprised of Christians and Jews living together, there is both cooperation and tension as to how to celebrate these two holy days in ways that are respectful to each others' religious convictions, and yet respectful to the differences between these two celebrations. Each spiritual tradition struggles with capturing the spiritual essence of the holiday (holy day) and not succumbing to the superficial – although charming – aspects so obvious in the advertisements. This can be especially true for Jewish children who succumb to "Christmas Envy".

There are no simple solutions to these issues. The Rabbis themselves were ambivalent about some of the results of the Chasmonean victory. We can start off by being aware of the issues and staying open-hearted to potential solutions.

For us, followers of the Jewish spiritual path, keeping in mind the essential messages of the 25th of Kislev — namely, that our rituals

OIL FOR THE LAMPS, THE ORIGINAL "LIGHT" OPERA

December 13 and 14. The performance is packed with surprises and rich with Chanukah lore. A brand-new production, its lively score and lyrics the work of composer-librettist Joi Freed-Garrod, the opera highlights eight different aspects of the holiday, one for each night.

With Tevye and his family telling the ancient history of Chanukah, the loosely constructed storyline follows the tale of Fiddler on the Roof after the family leaves Anatevka. They take the audience from 1906 to the present, from Russia to Canada. The inter-generational cast, drawn from Salt Spring Island's dynamic arts community, dance, act and sing the emigrant experience as the soft glow of each successive candle builds towards the eighth night.

Freed-Garrod explains that folk opera brings together folk music, which tells stories of the people in song, with the formal, musical-dramatic structure of opera. Chanukah, continued from page 1. wickedness," those who enacted the decrees to separate the Jews from G-d and Torah. These individuals could only be countered by those great Jews who were totally involved with the study of our Holy Torah - and thus "the provokers" could only fall "into the hands of those who involve themselves with Your Torah."

What goes around, comes around, and there is little doubt that our current society is in the midst of a moral decline. In last week's "RavFrاند" class, the Rabbi quoted a study of the top ten problems in the public schools forty years ago versus today - and the comparison was mind-boggling: forty years ago, gum-chewing in the halls was a problem; today, kids and teachers must watch out for knives. So many good people ask, what can I do to reverse this? How can I make an impact?

Rabbi Levinstein provides us with one answer. The Torah and its commentaries are repositories of ethical teachings and works of spiritual improvement. The more Torah that a person knows, the greater the "soldier" in society's spiritual battles. And the use of the various techniques and advice can indeed bring a person to a more ethical and spiritual level. The battle begins at home, or more accurately within oneself. One needn't be a great scholar, or even totally righteous - one merely needs to be free of a particular ill to be able to combat it. But the greater the person, the greater his or her impact.
