Walk on Water

Saturday September 29th was the first of the JCCV's Jewish Movie Nights, and this year, this monthly event is being hosted by our own Michael Gans and Bob Cameron. Bob made delicious gourmet popcorn which was included in the entry fee – only five bucks! Where else in town can you see a movie and get popcorn for that?

The movie offered for September was **Walk on Water**, an Israeli production in English, Hebrew and German, with subtitles as needed. On the surface it was a simple plot: a Mossad agent sent to get a Nazi war criminal, who until now, had evaded capture and prosecution. But there are many sub-plots which contribute to the character development and take the film to a considerably more complex level.

The three main characters are the Mossad agent, and a German sister and brother. The relationship that develops between the three, and in particular, the brother and the Israeli, is the underlying theme. All are dealing with hatreds that stem from the Holocaust which have hardened their hearts.

As the film mostly takes place in Israel, amidst current terrorist actions, it begs the comparison between the Nazis of the thirties and forties, and today's Arab terrorists. With some of the action taking place in Germany, where skinheads are making their intimidating presence known, this thought-provoking film asks if it will ever be over. Will the Jews ever be free from hatred and scapegoating?

Then there's the matter of the title, clearly a reference to Jesus. How does this play out in a Jewish film? As the story progresses, we witness the events that play upon the Israeli and the young German man, and lead them to new places where they can be whole, no longer slaves to their fears and hatreds.

Does walking on water then become a metaphor for a heart filled with love and acceptance? Does discarding the burdens of hatred and fear lighten one enough to walk on water? One could go on then to wonder about Jesus' purported miracle. But that's for another article.

There was an excellent turnout for the movie, including a fair showing of Kolot Mayim members. For those who didn't see the film, I highly recommend renting it. I, for one, would like to see it again. Michael's offerings for October and November are *A Serious Man*, and *Sunshine*, respectively.

The Victoria and Vancouver Island Jewish Burial Society

The Jewish Burial Society of Victoria and Vancouver Island is a service organization founded to assist all Jews with end of life requirements. We administer four totally separate and distinct sections in the Hatley Memorial Gardens and provide space for all persuasions of Jewish life from orthodox to secular, complete with cremation if specified.

The Society works with the Victoria Chevrah Kadisha in preparation of the body for burial, and works with the family in all ways to ensure that the concern and embrace of the entire community for the bereaved.

While we are a non profit Society, regretfully, end of life does not respect one's pocketbook, and costs are dear. There is a small membership charge that must be paid to become a member of our Society, and arrangements for this, and for burial requirements may be made at any time. We recommend dealing with one's self and saving the pain and expense of the survivors at a very stressful time.

The first stage of the beautification program is now complete. This consists of a network of paved pathways and a sign identifying the Jewish Community Section of the cemetery. In the very near future we hope to see a number of trees planted and a bench or benches placed. In the spring we hope to have a formal Service of Consecration at the cemetery, to which the whole of the Jewish community will be invited.

offer more continuity for our enthusiastic Torah scholars.



Sukkah-hopping on a Sunday

When attending religious school at Holy Blossom Temple in Toronto, I clearly remember making decorations for the Sukkah, and I remember figs and dates, and pears at this time, too. But I cannot recall where the Sukkah was or what it looked like! Maybe we were making decorations to put in our own Sukkahs at our homes?

What I do remember, however, is that we never had a Sukkah at our home. Nor did any of my friends have one. In fact, I don't think I'd ever seen one or been in one until coming to Kolot Mayim. Every year at Kolot Mayim, we build a small Sukkah; the Religious School kids decorate it, and at the end of the Kabbalat Shabbat service within the Sukkoth period, we go out to the Sukkah, wave the Lulav and Etrog, and say the appropriate prayers. This is the first time that I can remember ever performing the ritual of the Lulav and Etrog, as well.

Last year, I was delighted to attend the Sutkers' Open House in their Sukkah. This was the first time I had actually seen, let alone, sat in, a Sukkah at someone's home. This was the real thing! I was thoroughly impressed.

This year, as Co-chair of the Religious Affairs Committee, it was my responsibility to obtain a Lulav and Etrog for our Sukkoth observance. I had been told that Rabbi Cohen of Aish always gets them for us, so I had contacted him to, once again, get them for us this year.

Yesterday (Sunday, September 30th), I went to his home to pick them up. It was a beautiful, sunny afternoon. On the way, I dropped in on the Sutkers to return something to our Rabbi. I was warmly welcomed, with hugs all round and offers of coffee (or something stronger!) and crumble. Having just finished a large breakfast, I declined, but accepted the offer to see the newly completed Sukkah. It was so inviting, I just had to sit down and enjoy some time in it. Charlotte and I schmoozed and Louis joined in our conversation when not working in the yard.

At the Cohen's, I was warmly welcomed by Rabbi Barack and Shy, and ushered into the kitchen where Rachel was hard at work preparing the Festival dinner. I was treated to a sampling of Stuffed Onion filling, shown the Sukkah and the Mikveh, and enjoyed schmoozing with both of them as well. Their Sukkah was quite different from the Sutkers'. But equally as welcoming. I would love to see more Sukkahs, see the subtle variations in each, how each is decorated, and made homey. I'm sure there are as many variations as there are Jews.
